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

Dr. Constanze Adolf

Director Green Budget Europe Brussels Office

Constanze worked in the European Commission on demographic change and sustainable development and in the European Parliament and was director of EUFED, a Brussels-based European NGO, focusing on sustainable tourism. In this position, Constanze contributed to various experts groups on sustainable and responsible tourism at the European Commission, UNEP and UNWTO.

Since 2012, Constanze is Director of Green Budget Europe's Brussels office and responsible for GBE's advocacy work on environmental fiscal reform within the European institutions, EU Governments, international organisations, business, the research community and civil society. She has published in the field of environmental fiscal reform, European affairs and sustainable tourism.

Constanze is co-founder of a European Think Tank on sustainable development and is also guest lecturer at several Universities on European Affairs.

Trained as a banker and graduated from Passau University, Constanze studied Economics, Law and Cultural Studies in Odense (Denmark) and Strasbourg and holds a PhD in informal decision-making processes in the European institutions.

Before that he was CEO of Lafarge's cement business in Italy for four years until 2007. Lafarge is the world's largest building materials company.

Previously Chris was in Paris as Senior Vice-President Environment and Public Affairs at Lafarge from 1999 to 2003, in charge of environmental and sustainability issues, including their policy to reduce carbon emissions. While with Lafarge he set up a partnership with WWF that was their first with an industrial company.

Founder and Owner of ZMM Zeitmanager München GmbH (1996).</p> <p>Dr. Anselm Görres attended universities in Heidelberg and Geneva, majoring in economics and law, and was an assistant professor at the universities of Stuttgart and Munich, where he acquired his doctorate degree with a thesis on work time reductions. For five months in 1981, he was an intern at the IMF, Washington, D.C., and researched on trade in developing and emerging economies.</p> <p>After finishing his studies, Dr. Görres spent ten years in industry, first as a consultant with McKinsey & Co. and then as a Management-Buy-In investor in East Berlin.</p> <p>In 1996, he founded ZMM Zeitmanager München, today one of Germany's</p>

leading suppliers of interim services. In 2004, he became co-founder and president of the German Association of Interim Providers (www.aimp.de).

Since 1985, he has participated in the debate on market-based instruments for environmental policy, initially with several publications on eco-taxes. In 1994, he became co-founder and board member of the “Förderverein Ökologische Steuerreform”, which changed its name in 2008 to “Forum Ökologisch-Soziale Marktwirtschaft”, or Green Budget Germany. This non-profit organization specializes in all economic instruments, from eco-taxes and emission trading to subsidy reform, green purchasing, and Green Keynesianism, as well as debate about Green Growth. Today, Green Budget Germany promotes a broad vision of a greener and fairer eco-social market order.

In 2008, Green Budget Germany initiated Green Budget Europe as a European and international platform. Dr. Görres is president of GBE and speaks at many international conferences on Green Budget Reforms and Market Based Instruments.

In 2010, Anselm Görres initiated a joint venture between a number of green NGOs, to hold regular Academic days for an eco-social market economy at as many universities as possible within Austria, Germany and Switzerland (www.hochschultage.org)

Michael Grubb is Professor of International Energy and Climate Change Policy at University College London (Institute of Sustainable Resources), editor-in-chief of the journal *Climate Policy*, and Senior Advisor on Sustainable Energy Policy to the UK Office of Gas and Electricity Markets (the Energy Regulator Ofgem). His former positions include Senior Research Associate at Cambridge University (Faculty of Economics, Department of Land Economy); Chair of the international research organization *Climate Strategies*; Chief Economist at the Carbon Trust; Professor of Climate Change and Energy Policy at Imperial College London; and head of Energy and Environment at Chatham House, and he continues to be associated with these institutions. Professor Grubb has also served on the UK Climate Change Committee, established under the UK Climate Change Act to advise the government on future carbon budgets and to report to Parliament on their implementation. In 2013 he was the Specialist Advisor to a House of Lords European Committee enquiry. ‘No Country is an Energy Island: securing investment for the EU's Future’ (2013).

Michael Grubb is author of eight books, fifty journal research articles and numerous other publications. 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Philippe Lamberts

Co-Chair of the Group of the Greens/European Free Alliance in the European Parliament

Philippe Lamberts was born in 1963 in Brussels, Belgium. He studied Engineering in applied mathematics, at the Catholic University of Louvain.

From 1987 to 2009, he worked at IBM in a variety of positions, predominantly managing business with industrial and retail clients. He was elected in June 2009 for a first term in the European Parliament. His political career within the Belgian green party (Ecolo) started in 1991. He served 12 years as a local city councillor in Anderlecht and also as an adviser on foreign and defence policy to the Vice-Prime Minister Isabelle Durant during the first participation of the Greens in the Belgian federal government (1999-2003).

In 1999, he became a member of the Council of the European Federation of Green Parties as a representative of Ecolo. He was then elected to the executive Committee in 2003 before becoming co-chair of what meanwhile had become the European Green Party (EGP). His second mandate there will end in November 2012.

In the EGP, Philippe Lamberts has led the work on devising the Green New Deal as the response of the European Greens to the multi-faceted global crisis. In the European Parliament, Philippe focuses his work on the two committees he is member of. In the economic and monetary affairs committee (ECON) he predominantly deals with macro-economic, economic governance and banking issues. In the committee for industry, research and energy (ITRE) he acts primarily as the Greens' spokesperson on research and innovation issues and has a strong interest in industrial and SME policies. He is also member of the Parliament's delegation for the relations with China, a country which he sees as a crucial partner in meeting the global challenges of the 21st century.

Atle Leikvoll took up the position as Ambassador of Norway to the EU in August 2011 after having served as Deputy Secretary General at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs in Oslo for almost six years. Kai Schlegelmilch is an expert on Environmental Fiscal Reforms (EFR). He holds a diploma in political economics and has worked for 21 years in national and international research, policy and government institutions, focussing on energy and climate policies and required fiscal incentives.

Kai Schlegelmilch is co-founder of Green Budget Germany and Green Budget Europe and temporarily also led several projects full-time.

After his diploma in 1993, he has worked for the Wuppertal Institute for Climate, Environment and Energy, the European Environment Agency, the Parliamentarian Prof. Ernst Ulrich von Weizsäcker and for the Green Party in the German Parliament (Bundestag) before he joined the Federal Ministry for the

	<p>Environment, Nature Protection and Nuclear Safety in Germany in 1999 where he is employed until now. There he advised on the EFR and other energy and climate policies until 2006. He was member of the German delegation negotiating the EU energy tax directive 2003/96/EC between 1999 and 2003. Then he contributed to the preparation and implementation of the German EU Presidency in 2007. Afterwards he became deputy head of the division on hydro-power, wind energy and grid integration of renewable energies.</p> <p>Between 2012 and 2014, he was seconded to the German Environmental Protection Agency (Umweltbundesamt – UBA) and the regional Environment Ministry in North-Rhine-Westphalia. He also advised several Asian Governments regarding the implementation of an EFR on behalf of GIZ. He developed and applied trainings on Environmental Fiscal Reform, most recently for small islands development states. Professor for Environmental Economics, University of Goteborg

Thomas Sterner is an internationally renowned scholar whose work is focused around the design of policy instruments to deal with resource and environmental problems. He is professor of environmental economics at University of Gothenburg, Sweden, where he has built up the Unit for Environmental Economics. It is a leading Scandinavian and European center for environmental economics and gives a unique PhD program in climate economics with many graduate students from developing countries.

Sterner has published more than a dozen books and about one hundred articles in refereed journals, mainly on environmental policy instruments with applications to energy and climate, industry, transport economics and resource management in developing countries.

Sterner is the recipient of the Myrdal Prize, past president for the European Association of Environmental and Resource Economists and Associate Editor of Environmental and Resource Economics. He is also a Fellow or researcher at Resources for the Future, The Beijer Institute and Statistics Norway. With Gunnar Köhlin, he has founded the Environment for Development Initiative and is a member of the research board of several developing country networks such as CEEPA (Africa) and SANDEE (in South Asia) and the Board of Academic advisors to the Center for Chinese Agricultural Policy, CCAP of the Chinese Academy of Sciences.

During 2012 and 2013 he served as Visiting Chief Economist of the Environmental Defense Fund in New York. He has recently been elected as a guest professor at the Collège de France for 2015-16.

Jeremy Wates is the Secretary General of the European Environmental Bureau, Europe's largest federation of environmental organizations comprising about 140 member organizations from some 30 European countries with a combined membership of around fifteen million environmentally concerned citizens.

Prior to taking up his present post in May 2011, Jeremy served for more than a decade as Secretary to the Aarhus Convention with the Geneva-based United Nations Economic Commission for Europe. The Aarhus Convention is the world's most far-reaching international treaty on access to information, public participation in decision-making, and access to justice in environmental matters.

During the 1990s, Jeremy led the campaign by the European ECO Forum, an NGO coalition, to persuade governments to start work on a treaty on environmental democracy and then coordinated the input from civil society organizations into the official negotiations over the text of what was to become the Aarhus Convention.

In the 1980s, Jeremy founded the Irish environmental organization Earthwatch, the Irish member of Friends of the Earth International, and led the organization for more than a decade.

Jeremy holds an MA Honours Degree in Philosophy and Social & Political Sciences from Cambridge University, UK. His permanent home is in West Cork in the south-west of Ireland where in the '80s and '90s he combined his environmental activism with small-scale organic farming and where he and his wife brought up their four children in their early years.

In 2011, Jeremy was awarded the David Brower Lifetime Achievement Award.

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
